Jung believed the symbol provides the psychological machinery that transmutes energy. Roberto Assagioli, the Italian psychiatrist who founded psychosynthesis, saw symbols as conductors of psychical energies, and found them fundamental to the creative process. As the Lotus plant, through the life-giving energy of the sun transmutes the mud and water of the pond into a flower, so symbols can focus and inspire our own creative genius.

Ed Turner, founder and director of High Point Northwest, received his Doctor's Degree in religion and studied psychosynthesis under Dr. Assagioli. He emphasizes unconditional love in human relationships to balance the emphasis in the West on human will.

Saints and Tricksters is a medley of anecdotes on the lives of beloved saints and fools from such traditions as Native America, Mexico, Catholic Ireland and Italy, the Moslem Mideast, Tibet and China. The tale explores the glimmer of mischief in the eye of the Saint, and the spark of divinity in the soul of the fool.

The Lady of the Fountain, a tale that arose among the ancient Celts and reached its finished form as a medieval romance, tells of the adventures of a single-hearted hero endowed with intuitive powers but blind with unconsciousness. The hero is initiated into the central mysteries of life only to become spellbound. Awakened later, he returns to his former life only to completely forget his initiation. So he must undertake the quest again to achieve a mature initiation.

Erica Helm Meade has a Bachelor of Arts degree in poetry, is a published poet, and has told poems and stories throughout the United States for many years. Michael Meade received a B.A. in literature and combines his studies of mythology and rhythm instruments with telling poems.
