LOUISE BODE: THE PSYCHOLOGICAL AND SPIRITUAL ASPECTS OF THE TIBETAN BOOK OF THE DEAD

The ancient wisdom of the Tibetan Book of the Dead is strikingly relevant to our own daily experience. Written centuries ago as a guide for the dying as well as the living, it describes experiences just now being "discovered" in current research in death and dying. What is the meaning of all this for our own life and death? What can this wise old book, this treasured map of the psyche, tell us about human beings and the Infinite? Louise Bode will confront these questions in our February meeting.

LOUISE BODE is a Jungian Analyst who recently moved to the Seattle area from Chicago where she was in private practice and Director of Training at the C. G. Jung Institute of Chicago. She studied at the Jung Institute in Zurich, Switzerland, and is a graduate of the Interregional Society of Jungian Analysts. She has a long interest in Tibetan thought, and this Fall visited a number of monasteries in Ladakh (ancient Western Tibet).

REVENNA HELSON: ADULT DEVELOPMENT
AND CREATIVITY IN WOMEN.

The morning session will focus on
the individuation process exempli-
fied in the "modern" Edwardian
author E. Nesbit's best-known
works of fantasy for children and
their relation to her life and
development, with slide illustra-
tions and discussion.

In the afternoon, the focus will
open to adult development and
creativity in women from college to
midlife, through theory and find-
ings from a study of 135 women,
plus interviews with a small sample
of women artists and writers.

Material will be drawn from Doris
L. Ward's book, A Method of Biog-
raphy, and from E. Nesbit's Long
Ago when I Was Young: "Five Chil-
dren and It," "The Phoenix and the
Carpet," and "The Story of the
Amulet."

WILLIAM WILLEFORD: DREAM, MYTH AND
POEM.

Aboriginal Australians situated
mythical beings and events in the
"dream time"; classical Greeks
spoke of "mythopoiesis"--the poetic
creation, or re-creation, of myth.
This seminar will explore relations
between dream and myth as these
bear on poetic language.

Dreaming and mythic perception and thought will be characterized from a Jungian perspective. Jung's views will be drawn into relationship with those of the philosophers Ernst Cassirer and Michael Polanyi, and the naturalist Gregory Bateson.

Perspective and adaptive functions of dreams will be emphasized. The point of departure will be the psychology of the individual imagination, especially as influenced by unconscious psychic contents and processes.

Part of the Seminar will be devoted to discussion of poems (for example, by Blake, Whitman, Holderlin and Hart Crane) intended to be mythic or dream-like in character. Copies of these will be handed out to the participants.

WILLIAM WILLEFORD is a Jungian Analyst and Associate Professor of English and Comparative Literature at the University of Washington. Dr. Willeford graduated from the C. G. Jung Institute in Zurich and is author of The Fool and His Scepter and numerous articles on psychological and literary subjects.
