Masculine and Feminine: Inner and Outer Aspects

This lecture/workshop series presented by distinguished Jungian analysts arises naturally out of two concerns...

First, because people everywhere have a fascination about the differences in the psychology of men and women. Today especially there is a great deal of lively debate about what is masculine behavior, what is feminine behavior, and (in analytical psychology) what are the characteristics of male and female principles.

Second, since Carl Jung's pioneering efforts in describing the psychology of men and of women, other analytical psychologists have begun to make very important contributions in this area. There is much interest in integrating some of this newer material.

The speakers will consider: the influence of archetypal elements, those in-born, 'a-priori', organizing components of the psyche, in guiding the development of men and women; the inner woman (*anima*) in men, the inner male (*animus*) in women; the influence of these elements in heterosexual and homosexual relationships; and finally the reciprocal influence of these elements in the individual and in the culture in which the individual lives.

All lectures will be held Friday evenings at Kane Hall, University of Washington campus. Unless otherwise noted, the workshops will be held on Saturdays at the Burke Museum, also on the U.W. campus.

Male experience enfolds as biology, psyche and the search for meaningful interaction at each stage of the life cycle. The archetypes of Hero, Father, and Wise Old Man are some of the most important organizing principals of that enfolding. This workshop will continue an exploration of the psychology of the masculine by tracing the interweaving of these archetypes through myth, case history, and the ideas and personal experience of workshop participants.

Dr. Colman is a Jungian analyst, author, lecturer, and clinical professor of psychiatry at the University of California Medical Center. He was a leading figure in the development and design of alternative birth centers and is co-author of two books; Pregnancy: the Psychological Experience; and Earth Father, Sky Father, which are ground breaking works on the psychology of parenting. In addition to private practice, Dr. Colman is president of the A.K. Rice Institute, an organization devoted to the study of the unconscious in group life.

Centerpoint is a personal study program for those who find the psychology of C.G. Jung compatible with their own thinking and want to join with a small group to pursue their own inner journey. Participants hope to find their own relations to Jungian understanding, fairy tales, myths and dreams. The groups meet every week or so (at the group's choice), and listen to and discuss one of 18 taped sessions. The self-paced course can take as little as 18 weeks, or as long as nine months. Each person keeps a journal of dreams and other reflections during the course of the program. However, this is NOT a dream therapy group. Lecture: The Tarot: A Source of Psychological and Spiritual Wisdom

Jung recognized that the Tarot had its origins in profound patterns of the collective unconscious, and represents one of the non-rational bridges across the apparent divide between the unconscious and consciousness. Thus the Tarot can act as a resource for renewing and enlarging consciousness.

In this lecture we will explore viewing the Tarot as a set of symbols and archetypes of experience; as a description of the process of individuation or the spiritual journey; as a symbolic system of objective knowledge; and as a divinitory tool. The speaker will share some personal experiences with the Tarot and discuss some practical aspects of how the cards can be used.

Linda Shepherd holds a Ph.D. in biochemistry and has worked in health care research and development for ten years. Over the past three years the Tarot has become an important resource in her own inner work.
