Jung felt that uniting the opposites - conscious and unconscious, light and dark, good and evil - will be the spiritual task of the Aquarian age. To reach this difficult goal, we must first become conscious of the reality of evil. Identifying with the good, light, true and beautiful or denying what lives in the unsavory dark have ceased to be viable options. Only by facing the shadow squarely can we become equal to our awesome ethical burden, for we have stolen the power to destroy the planet from the gods. The book Dr. Dallett is writing, "Saturday's Child", walks around the problem of evil as Dr. Dallett meets it in her life and work as a Jungian analyst. Three chapters are finished: "What Rough Beast" introduces the subject; "Lillith" is about the contemporary eruption into consciousness of the legendary demon-goddess reputed to have been Adam's first wife; and "Falling" tells of the birth of healing from suffering in a little girl's relationship with her narcissistic older brother. Dr. Dallett's presentation will select parts of this material and/or chapters in progress.

People who plan to take part in the workshop are urged to attend Friday night's lecture. Beginning with the participants' responses to the lecture, Dr. Dallett will go further into these issues. One or more additional chapters of the book will also be offered, but Friday's material will not be repeated. Recommended reading includes Jung's Answer to Job, Aion and the first two chapters of Memories, Dreams, and Reflections. If you request a reading list and send in a self addressed envelope when you register (in advance) for the workshop we will be glad to provide it.

Janet O. Dallet, Ph.D., is a graduate and member of the C. G. Jung Institute in Los Angeles, where she taught for many years and was Director of Training. Her doctorate in psychology is from UCLA. She has authored many books and articles including her recently published When the Spirits Come Back as well as a book of poems. She lives, writes, and practices Jungian analysis in the Pacific Northwest.

INCARNATION OF THE REALITIES OF THE SELF

\$3 members / \$5 non-members In these modern times, sometimes called the "New Age" We are exposed to many views and interpretations of Incarnation or even Reincarnation. We hear of Channels, Spiritual Guides, Past Lives, Spiritual Media, Supreme Consciousness, becoming one with the Light, and so on. What seems to be missing, and dangerously so, in most of these claims to embodying the Divine Spirit, is any awareness of the complex psychology involved when a person in the Western tradition is exposed to what Jung would call an aspect of the Self.

This presentation addresses this issue of incarnation of the Self from the point of view of Jungian psychology. Mr. Radecki will attempt to show what happens psychologically when a person is engaged in the process of the incarnation of the Self. Further, he will show what ethical stance is imperative for the person to adopt in the face of such events.

Nathan Schwartz-Salant is a Jungian analyst practicing in New York City and Princeton. He is the author of Narcissism and Character Transformation and the recently published book The Borderline Personality, Vision He has a Ph.D. and Healing. from the U.C., Berkeley, and a Diploma in Analytical Psychology from the C.G. Jung Institute in Zurich. He is co-editor of the Chiron Clinical Series, and Director of the Salant Foundation and the Center for Analytical Psychology in Princeton.

# WEST COAST FILM PREMIERE! BRITISH DIRECTORPRODUCER STEVEN SEGALLER'S NEW DOCUMENTARY FILM OF C.G. JUNG

THE WISDOM
OF THE
DREAM

The Wisdom of The Dream has been made with the cooperation of the Jung Institutes in Switzerland, Britain, and the United States. The film includes interview material from: Professor C.A. Meier, Dr. Gerhard Adler, Dr. Marie-Louise von Franz, Mrs. Aniela Jaffee, Dr. Joseph Henderson, and Dr. Joe and Mrs. Jane Wheelwright. Major contributions to the film were made by Dr. James Hillman, Dr. Edward Edinger, Dr. Harry Wilmer, Dr. John Beebe, Mrs. Dora Kalff, and Robert Johnson.

The film also includes restored, previously unseen footage of Jung in Africa and at Eranos. In addition there are extracts from Jung's interview with Dr.

Richard Evans in 1957 never seen before in a public medium and sequences shot in Jung's library and consulting room, at the lakeside in Bollingen and at the Swiss National Carnival of Fasnacht, and in Jung's home town, Basel. It also contains location filming which retraces Jung's journeys in pursuit of the collective unconscious and the meaning of mythology and paintings by Jung's own patients from the Picture Archive of the Jung Institute, Kusnacht, Switzerland. In addition to the screening, Stephen Segaller and Merrill Berger, Ph.D. in Clinical Psychology, will each give a presentation considering aspects of the Jungian filmmaking experience from the different perspectives of producerdirector and psychologist. Along with the release of the film, the book The Wisdom of The Dream will be published by Shambhala Publications of Boston in October 1989. The content and style of this new book are designed to introduce Jung to those who know nothing of his work. The book is co-authored by Stephen Segaller and Merrill Berger.

The exact times of the film's showings and the cost of tickets are not known as this newsletter goes to press. The society will send a flyer in November with further details, but mark your calendars well in advance. You won't want to miss this one.

Stephen Segaller, an independent documentary producer, had a background in current affairs reporting before turning to documentary projects which concern religion, psychology, and the inner life. He produced, directed, and brought film series "Gnostics" to the C.G. Jung Society, Seattle last year.

Dr. Merrill Berger has a private practice in individual, child, and family psychotherapy in London and Boston, and draws substantially on Jung's work. Dr. Berger was the program associate for the series.
