In 1929 Dr. Jung wrote: "... About a third of my cases are not suffering from any clinically definable neurosis, but from the senselessness and aimlessness of their lives. I should not object if this were called the general neurosis of our age."
(*Collected Works*, Vol. 16, par. 83)

What is meaning? Where do we find meaning in our lives today? Does Jungian psychology provide avenues through which the individual may experience greater meaningfulness in life? Is it the search for meaning and value that leads people to Dr. Jung?

The growing interest in things Jungian has birthed a second series of Monday night talks. While continuing to provide a basic understanding of the principles of analytical psychology, the new series will be centered around questions concerning meaning and value.

Participation in the entire series is a comprehensive learning experience, while attendance at single sessions will provide new perspectives for those familiar with Jung's ideas. Each event will allow maximum time for discussion, and a sixth evening will be devoted to discussion of the series' topics.

Martha Mae Newell • *Reflections on the Persona's Meaning Auditioned Through Sound* • January 13

The word "persona" comes from the Latin verb *personave*, meaning "to sound through," yet most descriptions of the persona have referred to visual representations—clothing, social manners, etc. The lecture will explore the origins of the term used by Dr. Jung to refer to one of the components of the psyche and the new understanding that can come when sound is included in the definition of persona. Dr. W. Ladson Hinton • *Some Darker Sides of the Human Soul* • February 3

The subtle and not-so-subtle ways the shadow controls our attitudes and actions will be the subject of this talk. Dr. Ladson Hinton will address the question, What is the relationship between consciousness and ethics? Given the impossibility of living a "pure" life, self-righteousness and perfectionism lie at the core of the most destructive actions. Examples will be taken from literature, anthropology, and depth psychology.

Patricia Warming • *Toward a Rediscovery of Soul* • February 24

In one of his last letters, Jung wrote: "I have failed in *my foremost task*, to open people's eyes to the fact that *man has a soul*, that there is a buried treasure in the field, and that our religion and philosophy are in a lamentable state." Using insights from religion, mythology, and depth psychology, This lecture will examine such questions as: What is Soul? How is it known, described, and experienced? How do dreams mirror the life of the soul? How

Louise Bode • *Meaning In-Bodied* • March 9

In the final analysis, we count for something only because of the essential we embody, and if we do not embody that, life is wasted.

The strong emotions contained in feelings of love, of suffering, and in illness must first be embodied in order to hold meaning. Once these experiences are felt in the realm of the heart, transformation is possible. Louise Bode will present material to illustrate what this looks like and feels like for the individual.

Dr. Terrill Gibson • *Jung and the Mystical Soul of the West* • March 23

This evening's lecture will explore Dr. C.G. Jung's profound impact on the recovery of ancient spiritual directive techniques in our era. Special attention will be given to Jung's provocative insights into the living Gnostic and mystical expressions of the psyche. The lecture will feature frequent use of personal and clinical anecdotes and images to amplify the theme.

***Panel discussion* • April 6**

An informal discussion led by a panel of Jungian analysts in which the topics of the five talks will be discussed further.

Louise Bode is a Jungian analyst in private practice for 16 years. She studied at the University of Chicago, where she received her M.A., and at the C.G. Jung Institute in Zurich. She was a founding member of and training director at the C.G. Jung Institute in Chicago, and is a training analyst for the Inter-Regional Society.

Dr. Terrill L. Gibson is a pastoral psychotherapist and Jungian analyst practicing in Tacoma. He lectures and writes widely on the theme of the integration of psychotherapy and spirituality. He has been a frequent consultant, faculty member, supervisor, and facilitator for a variety of Pacific Northwest universities, social service agencies, corporations, and churches. He has a passion for Lionel trains.

Dr. W. Ladson Hinton is a graduate and faculty member of the C.G. Jung Institute of San Francisco and an associate clinical professor of psychiatry at Stanford. Recently he has relocated to Seattle, where he is in private practice as a Jungian analyst as well as the president of the newly formed analytic group Jungian Analysts—North Pacific.

Martha Mae Newell, M.A., is a Jungian analyst practicing in Portland. She is a graduate of the New York Jung Institute, where she was coordinator of training, and holds degrees from the University of Colorado and Yale Divinity School. She has traveled throughout Western Europe, the Soviet Union, India, and Pakistan. She is interested in music and its relation to the psyche.

Patricia Warming, M.A., M.Div., is a diplomate Jungian analyst in private practice in Seattle. She received her degrees from Princeton Theological Seminary and the C.G. Jung Institute in Zurich. She recently moved here from Denver, where she was a founding member and past president of the C.G. Jung Institute in Denver.

The C.G. Jung Society, Seattle, and the University of Washington Extension are cosponsoring this unique series of 20 half-hour films presented as a two-day seminar. Universally relevant dreams are vividly presented on film and then movingly interpreted by Dr. Marie-Louise von Franz, a renowned analytical psychologist. She is interviewed on film by Frazer Boa, a Jungian analyst and the creator of the film series. Dr. Terrill Gibson, a Jungian analyst from Tacoma, will introduce the films and lead the audience in discussion.

Following the format of the film series, the seminar introduces participants to the basic psychology of Dr. C.G. Jung, explores Jung's concept of dream interpretation, and examines the historical significance of dreams in our culture. The series moves on to an extensive analysis of the dreams of men and women. Finally, Dr. von Franz addresses the problems of human relationships in our changing world and explores the puzzling question of who creates our dreams.

Two optional events are included in the price of the seminar. A social

gathering with food and drink will immediately follow the first day of films from about 6 to 7 P.M. at Kane Hall. Participants may also attend one-time evening discussion groups meeting in Seattle on March 4 and 6, and in Tacoma on March 4. Sex in the Forbidden Zone: When Men in Power Betray Women's Trust

Dr. Peter Rutter's recently published book challenges professionals and their clients to confront the hidden epidemic of sexual contact between male professionals—therapists, doctors, clergy, lawyers, teachers, and mentors—and women under their care or tutelage. Dr. Rutter will elaborate on his Jungian understanding of how archetypal power emanating from the unconscious can invest forbidden-zone relationships with overwhelming erotic allure. He will discuss ways in which both men and women can develop healthier means of dealing with sexual boundary problems over which they may feel a lack of control, ambivalence, or vulnerability to invasion.

Dr. Peter Rutter's work on sexual exploitation does more than focus attention on seldom-discussed areas of sexual boundary violation. He will show how forbidden-zone relationships, when ethically pursued, have immeasurable value in providing us access to the deepest resources of self, which, in turn, can help us to explore and integrate personal issues related to power, to sexual fantasy, and to the search for healing and wholeness. The workshop will explore ways these personal issues are linked in the forbidden zone to wider social issues such as our culture's struggle to rebalance masculine and feminine power. Some of the issues addressed will include:

- Understanding the psychological and social dynamics of relationships of trust.
- Understanding the mind-state of both parties at the moment of boundary-crossing as well as personal wounds that lie in their backgrounds.
- Secret-keeping within institutions as a key element in the perpetuation of incestuous, dysfunctional patterns.
- Intervention and prevention—on personal, collegial, and institutional levels.
- Recovery for both perpetrator and victim of sexual boundary violations.

Peter Rutter, M.D., a psychiatrist and Jungian analyst in San Francisco, is the author of *Sex in the Forbidden Zone: When Men in Power—Therapists, Doctors, Clergy, Teachers and Others—Betray Women's Trust* (Jeremy P. Tarcher 1989). Dr. Rutter is a faculty member and former chair of the Ethics Committee of the C.G. Jung Institute of San Francisco, and is an associate clinical professor in the department of psychiatry at the University of California Medical School, San Francisco. He has consulted, lectured, and given workshops on sexual exploitation to psychology and clergy groups in the United States and Great Britain. His book has been translated into French, German, Italian, Dutch, Finnish, and Portuguese.

There is a well-known association between the physical and mental illnesses of many artists and their creative outflow. Dr. Thomas Pautler will speak on "I am not sick, I am broken"—the Life and Paintings of Frida Kahlo (1907–1954)." This Mexican artist was seriously injured in a bus accident at age 19. The work of Frida Kahlo reflects her chronic pain, failed and often grotesque medical treatments, her social consciousness, her volatile relationship with Diego Rivera, as well as many rich archetypal themes. Kahlo is increasingly recognized not only for her art, but for the exuberance with which she embraced life, her feminist integrity, and the triumph of her spirit.

Rick Nelson will speak on "Bright Images in Dark Depression—The Creative Process and Mental Illness." Evidence of mental illness associated with the creative process will be examined as it relates to mania and depression. Examples from the works of Sylvia Plath, Theodore Roethke, Ann Sexton, and Vincent van Gogh will be discussed. Participants are invited to bring stories, poems, or art pieces that have come out of their own experiences of illness.

Thomas Pautler, M.D., practices mind-body medicine in Seattle. He is a writer, a clinical preceptor for the Creighton School of Medicine, and a Vietnam veteran. *Phallos: The Masculine
Alternative to Patriarchy*

Patriarchy, which can be considered as a social means of masculine identity, is declining in its power as a political force. With the outer structure cracking, upon what can men depend for their inner bedrock, their fundamental sense of themselves as males?

This lecture for men and women will investigate the possibility that phallos, the determinative indicator of the male gender, understood both experientially and archetypally, moves us in an authentic direction. From time immemorial, phallos has been understood as a sacred image so basic to masculine identity and behavior that it is impossible to know or comprehend maleness apart from it. Dr. C.G. Jung wrote: "The phallos is the source of life and libido, the creator and worker of miracles, and as such it was worshipped everywhere."

It is time that men, and women as well, come to understand and acknowledge phallos as an essential ingredient in the human equation.

*Castration: Phallic Wounding

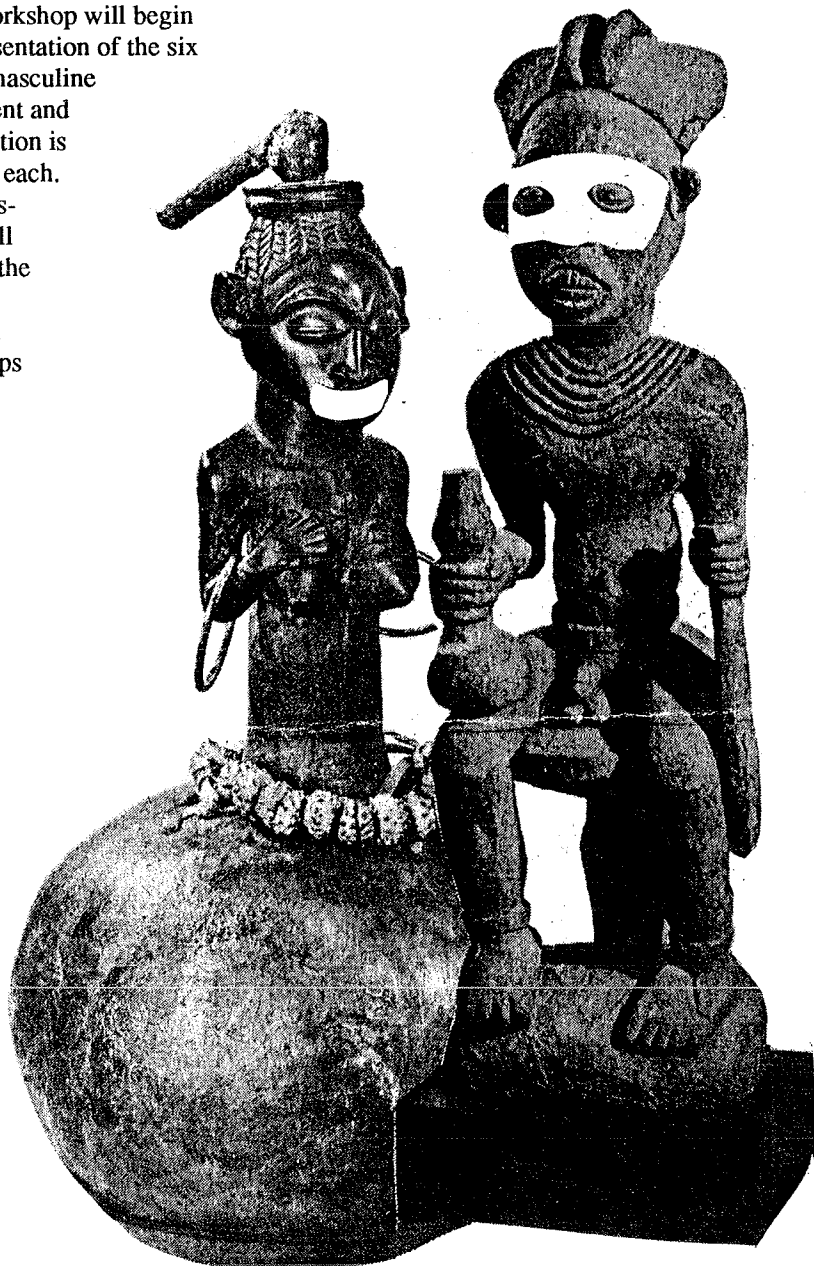
Castration is the basic male anxiety, according to Dr. Sigmund Freud. Phallos is so fundamental to maleness that its removal, insult, or diminishment suggests to men that they have been critically wounded. Their response is self-protective rage.

In order to understand castration anxiety, one must grasp its metaphorical importance and how this relates to the establishment of phallic ownership in six stages of masculine development. Only then does Dr. C.G. Jung's notion of individuation make sense for a man.

Castration, however, is paradoxical. The avoidance of it is as diminishing as the wounding from it. The revelation of its paradoxical quality is a particularly Jungian contribution to the understanding of castration.

The workshop will begin with a presentation of the six stages of masculine development and how castration is implicit in each. General discussion will follow. In the afternoon, each of six small groups will focus on one particular stage.

Dr. Eugene Monick, a graduate of the C.G. Jung Institute in Zurich, has a private practice in New York City and in Scranton, Pennsylvania. Between 1965 and 1975, he served as an Episcopal priest in New York City. Dr. Monick holds a doctorate from the Union Institute of Cincinnati, Ohio. He has published two books: *Phallos: Sacred Image of the Masculine*, Inner City Books, 1987, and *Castration and Male Rage: The Masculine Wound*, Inner City Books, 1991.
