The Dreaming World, The Natural World

I frequently walk around the peninsula that is Seward Park. As I walk, I read, looking up occasionally to avoid puddles or potholes in the path before me. My eyes are also drawn from the page to behold nature in its many manifestations: the gentle waves of Lake Washington lapping along the shore; the old growth looming majestically overhead; the cry of a mature eagle as it wings its way to the highest limb of the tallest tree.

My simultaneous reading and walking draws mixed reactions from passersby. Yet were it not for this combined activity, I may never have found the time to read Allan Chinen's Beyond the Hero or Peter Bishop's The Greening of Psychology, books read mostly around Seward Park, books that inspired me to propose these authors as speakers for this spring's Dream and Nature series.

Books about dreams, soul, and nature create within the reader a hunger for images. Nature, like dreams themselves, is rich in imagery, constantly evolving, never to be fully

apprehended, at best appreciated for its Otherness. In this way, some books seem to be enhanced when read out-of-doors in image-rich locations.

This spring the Jung Society's board and program committee are pleased to bring you speakers who will both present you with images through their lectures and workshops, and draw forth images and symbols from within your own psyches. Our Dream series will commence with a keynote address by authors Allan Chinen, M.D. and Karen Signell, Jungian Analyst. The Nature series (as well as the programming year for the Society) will be "endnoted" by Peter Bishop, who is coming to us from South Australia.

Since some of our presenters are authors, I offer you a recommendation. Buy one of their books in advance of their lecture. Then take a walk or a seat in one of your favorite places in nature.

The Dream Series

Series Keynote: Allan Chinen and Karen Signell Gifts of the Night: Ways of Working with Dreams

Dreams emerge from the unconscious, carrying archetypal symbols and the wisdom of the deep self. This lecture will explore different ways of working with dreams, emphasizing the importance of experiencing dreams, rather than just interpreting them. Basic guidelines of Jungian dream work will be discussed, touching on three levels of symbolism in dreams—personal, communal, and archetypal. When experienced in a deep way, dreams can be transformative, catalyzing changes in real life.

Allan Chinen, M.D., a psychiatrist in private practice in San Francisco, is Associate Clinical Professor of Psychiatry at the University of California, San Francisco. The author of *In the Ever After*, Once Upon a Midlife, and Beyond the Hero, he lectures widely on adult development and aging.

Karen Signell, Ph.D., a clinical psychologist and Jungian analyst, is on the faculty of the C. G. Jung Institute of San Francisco, where she teaches Active Imagination. She is the author of Wisdom of the Heart: Working with Women's Dreams, which has been translated into Danish,

Solomon's Soul: Dreams of the Sacred Union

In this lecture, we will wrestle with specific problems inherent in following, developmentally, the dream image of the "Beloved Within" toward the sacred union of spirit and matter. When must we live out through relationship these profound energies of passion and devotion, and when must we bear their tension, draw in the projections, and spiritualize and contain them in the psychic vessel? Jung described this conflict as trial by fire, which ultimately drives us into the dark earth, leading to great suffering and sacrifice, so that the deep fires may begin the soulmaking work within us.

Dreamwork: Embodying the Sacred Union

In this day-long workshop we will bring the ideas down to earth. We will continue discussion of the material as it relates to our lives and relationships, with dreamsharing, creative processes, and journal work. Participants are encouraged to bring dreams of anima or animus content, and art pads/colors, so that we might experience the embodiment of the sacred images of union as our own.

Ken Kimmel, M.A., Licensed Marriage, Family, and Child Counselor, is a Jungian-oriented therapist in private practice in Seattle. Portions of his field research among the healers and mediums of Central and South America have been published in Dr. Stanley Krippner and Dr. Alberto Villoldo's Realms of Healing.

Dreams in the Analytical Process

Jung once spoke of dreams as a place where our complexes are on stage. In analysis, when dreams become part of a therapeutic alliance these "characters" can take on new or different roles. Often new ones are introduced as the psyche rewrites the story toward individuation. This presentation will look at dreams as part of the long process of analysis, and how their transformations can signal the basic working out and working through of life's wounds. The challenge and the promise of working with dreams lies in looking for the balance between inner and outer, spiritual and commonplace, past and present.

Kimbrough Besheer, M.Div., is a graduate of the C. G. Jung Institute of Zurich and the Episcopal Divinity School of Cambridge, Massachusetts. He is a Jungian analyst in private practice on Mercer Island, a member of Jungian Analysts-North Pacific, and serves on the board of the North Pacific Institute for Analytical Psychology.

World Dreams

In recent years psychotherapy, including the Jungian community, has come under increasing criticism for neglecting the suffering of the world. Some see a one-sided focus on the inner life as an escape from the numbing political realities that confront us. This lecture will attempt to clarify Jung's views on the prophetic nature of dreams, and their ability to re-connect us to the world. For our text we will use several dreams that are clear examples of the world soul speaking to and through us.

Randy Morris, Ph.D., is a core faculty member in the Liberal Studies program at Antioch University, and has a small private practice in Jungian-oriented spiritual counseling. He is currently editing a book titled *Spirituality and Adult Education*.

Fall Program Preview Alchemy in Transformation

Keynote Speaker: Stephen Hoeller Endnote Speaker: Don Sandner

In alchemy, C. G. Jung found an historical tradition that validated and helped to make sense of both his personal experiences during the 1912-1919 period and the psychological theories that evolved from those experiences.

This series will help to define what alchemy is and to delineate its significance for analytical psychology. Those who attend the series may:

- learn the alchemical significance of Jung's statement that "the shadow is mostly pure gold;"
- confront their fears of Latin and familiarize themselves with alchemical terms such as massa confusa, opus, vas, nigredo, coniunctio, separatio, and mortificatio; and
- differentiate between the "puffers" and "pursuit of physical gold" in Jung's psychological and spiritual pursuit of pure gold.

Language and Nature:

The Mythic Edge and Reinhabitation

This lecture will focus on the relationship between human nature and the natural world—on Nature as embodied and expressed in language, especially in the condensed experience embedded in the roots of words. We will be guided down, from the surface gloss of contemporary language, into the world of word origins and the dreaming memorialized in language, to the true word as a storehouse of lore from the natural world. We will gain a deeper understanding of the relationship between psyche and Nature as expressed in our everyday speech.

Tom Jay is a poet, essayist, and sculptor who has lived in the Northwest since 1965. He has a B.A. in art from Seattle University (1966), an M.F.A. from University of Washington (1970), and has studied at Pomona College and the Pratt Institute. His most recent book is *Reaching Home: Pacific Salmon, Pacific People*.

The Vegetable World and Depth Psychology

Jung's ideas about our psychological relationship with the vegetable world have tended to be overshadowed by the contributions he made toward elaborating our imaginal kinship with the animal world. Yet through the study of dreams, myths, science, alchemy, primal religions, and rituals Jung began to make important suggestions, not just about how we can reimagine our relationship with the vegetable kingdom, but about a vegetative region of the psyche. Neglect of what was known in Classical and Renaissance times as the vegetable soul has had terrible consequences on both the outer environment and the inner lives of individuals and society.

The Greening of Psychology and the Reenchantment of the World

We will explore some of the ways that the work of Jung and others allows us to reimagine the green level of the psyche and our culture, to tap into a deep reservoir of hope and healing, to begin to revision accepted notions of consciousness and identity, and to begin to explore the *Anima Mundi*, the Soul of the World.

Peter Bishop, Ph.D., is an Associate Professor in Communications and Cultural Studies at the University of South Australia. His books include *The Greening of Psychology*, *The Myth of Shangri-La*, and *Dreams of Power: Tibetan Buddhism and the Western Imagination*.

President's Message

The 1994-95 program year draws to an end. It has been wonderful to see so many new faces at Jung Society programs this year and to see old members returning. We appreciate your support. A major goal the board hopes to achieve by June, 1995 is to secure a location for the library. The ultimate dream for the Jung Society is a building in Seattle in which Friday lectures, Saturday workshops, and study groups can be held, and which also has space for a growing library. The budget the Society has for this now is approximately \$200 a month. Clearly this dream would remain a fantasy without a realistic plan.

The board has developed a plan to realize this goal:

- Begin with a site that will house only the library, but in which workshops and study groups can be held.
- 2. Ask the 250-person membership to contribute a minimum of \$5 (or as much as they wish) to a supplemental fund for the rental of this library/workshop/study group space.

Millie Royce responded to the President's request in the Fall newsletter for volunteers to help find a location for the library. To date she has assisted board member Bunny Brown in finding several sites, one of which the board is seriously considering. The rent for this particular site is \$400 a month for 400 square feet. The building is centrally located on Eastlake Avenue.




Library Notice

Meeting Locations


Directions to Good Shepherd Center, Wallingford Senior Center
