Jung & Religion

For thousands of years the mind of man has worried about the sick soul, perhaps even earlier than it did about the sick body. The propitiation of gods, the perils of the soul and its salvation, these are not yesterday's problems. Religions are psychotherapeutic systems in the truest sense of the word, and on the grandest scale. They express the whole range of the psychic problem in mighty images; they are the avowal and recognition of the soul, and at the same time the revelation of the soul's nature. From this universal foundation no human soul is cut off; only the individual consciousness that has lost its connection with the psychic totality remains caught in the illusion that the soul is a small circumscribed area, a fit subject for "scientific" theorizing. The loss of this great relationship is the prime evil of neurosis.

The Grail & the Gold: Jungian Re-discovery & Use of Western Images of the *Imago Dei*

In many important ways, Jungian analysis is an archeological field dig. It seeks what is lost and yet still alive and vital for the individuals, couples, and families it serves. But it is also a dig into what is lost and yet still alive and vital for our culture, too.

Perhaps the most important recovery work of Jungian psychology focuses on the numinous divine idols turned up by ancient psychic soils churned up in the analytical process. These *imago dei*, images of god, are precious, still living, but very ancient centers of dynamic psychic commentary about the ongoing power and influence of numinal forces in our personal and collective destinies. This presentation reflects on some of these touching and animate idols-of-soul. There is a vast, vibrant archive of such material and this talk will point to possible beginnings and deepenings with these living libraries of image.

Terrill L. Gibson, Ph.D., is a diplomate pastoral psychotherapist and diplomate Jungian analyst who practices individual and family therapy with Pastoral Therapist Associates in Tacoma. He lectures and writes widely on the basic theme of the integration of psychotherapy and spirituality. He has been a frequent consultant, supervisor and facilitator for a variety of Pacific Northwest universities, social service agencies, corporations, and religious congregations. A book he co-edited with Laura Dodson, Ph.D., *Psyche and Family*, is his most recent publication.

Dionysus & the Individuation Process

Ancient Greeks knew the necessity of honoring equally dynamic yet opposing forces which ruled mortal man's rational and emotional life, the gods Apollo and Dionysus. Ours is an Apollonian culture, following the attributes of only this god. Rational thought, a pattern of solar consciousness, has dominated our orientation to ourselves, our relationships with others, and our interaction with our environment. We have repressed the Dionysian aspect, the god of darkness and chaos, yet also the god of ecstasy and intoxication. And at great cost to an emotionally fulfilling and creative life. Dr. Jung established the Dionysian element as a basic structure of our psyche. What had been regarded as unbridled and dangerous aspects of life to be dissected and tamed began to be seen as vital parts of ourselves to be brought into consciousness.



Who is this god, so incongruent to conscious understanding, the god Kerenyi names "the archetype of indestructible life"? The Friday night lecture will bring to focus the attributes of Dionysus, his terror and his benevolence. Through myths, the Orphic religion, and other writings, Saturday's workshop will center around slides from the Villa of Mysteries, Pompeii. These ancient pictures from the exotic friezes have modern meaning for they tell the story of one's individuation process. We will stay carefully attuned to Euripides' warning written in the *Bacchae* as he has Dionysus shout, "Too late you have learned to know me: When the knowledge was wanted you had it not."

Nancy Qualls-Corbett, Ph.D., diplomate of the C.G. Jung Institute, Zurich, is a practicing analyst in Birmingham, Alabama. She is the author of *The Sacred Prostitute: Eternal Aspects of the Feminine*. On this subject she is a frequent lecturer, as well as the topic of the god Dionysus. For the past several years, Nancy combines her love for travel and mythology while serving as a co-leader for Jungian seminars in Italy, Egypt, and Greece. A past officer in the Inter-Regional Society of Jungian analysts, she remains active in all phases of training with this group.

Initiation in Individual & Collective Lives

In the lives of individuals and cultures, initiation takes place at many times and at many levels of experience. Joy and tragedy visit the lives of individuals, initiating profound transitions. Societal upheavals such as war, and natural ones like earthquakes, affect entire cultures. The rhythmic change of seasons, both natural and personal, deeply influences the human experience.

Before we learned to explain, or attempted to control such events "scientifically," human societies celebrated these occurrences by means of initiatory rites. From the perspective of initiation, experience was seen in the context of an archetypal world blessed by divine presence. In this way, the important transitions of human existence attained symbolic meaning.

This lecture will inform us about the archetypal dimensions of the stages of individual and collective life. Using illustrations from many cultures, it will show how ancient rites of passage still exist; and how, through dreams and similar materials, they reappear as symbols in the contemporary psyche.

Manisha Roy, Ph.D. is a psychological anthropologist and Jungian analyst. Born and brought up in India, she was educated at the Universities of Chicago and California. Author of *Bengali Women* (University of Chicago Press, 1976), she has also co-edited *Cast the First Stone: Ethics in Analytic Practice* (Chiron, 1995). She was a close friend and colleague of the late Kate Millard.

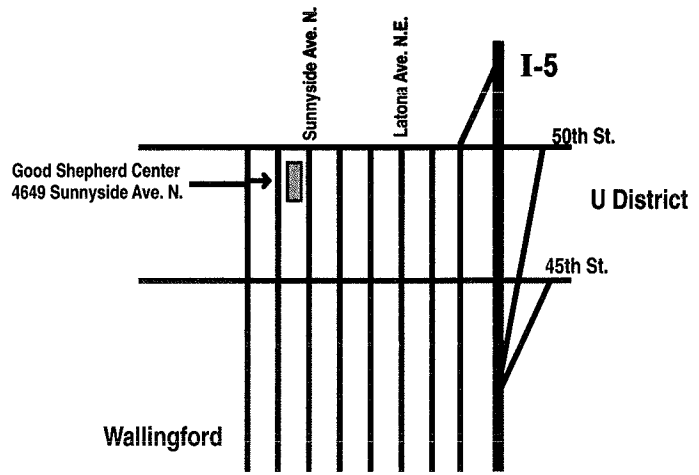
Our annual holiday party takes place at the time of the traditional Christmas festival of Twelfth Night. There will be good company, good cheer, and good conversation.
